THE EXERCISE OF THE HEART AND THE SPIRIT IN GOD'S ECONOMY

Dealing with the Heart and the Spirit

I. To contact the Lord is a matter of the spirit, but this must be initiated and maintained by the heart, which is the gateway to our whole being:

- A. The heart is both the entrance and exit of our being—whatever enters must enter through the heart and whatever exits must proceed through the heart.
- B. The heart is the controlling organ.
- C. The love of the Lord is the best way to unlock the door of the heart—S. S. 1:2; John 21:15-17.

II. Dealing with the heart:

- A. Our psychological heart has three main arteries; these arteries, which are also the three parts of the soul, are the mind, the will, and the emotion; the way to unclog the three main arteries of our psychological heart is to make a thorough confession to the Lord.
- B. We may begin by confessing all the sinfulness and uncleanness that is in our mind, in our thinking; by confessing our thoughts one by one, we shall remove the blockage from this artery.
- C. If we go to the Lord concerning our will, He will expose it in a thorough and detailed way; we shall realize that we are very rebellious, that we do not know what it means to be submissive to the Lord; one by one, we need to confess the germs of rebellion in our will.
- D. The artery of the emotion also needs to be unclogged; when we realize how serious is the problem we have with our emotion, we may be deeply sorrowful; we shall realize that in many cases we hate what we should love, and love what we should hate.
- E. If we would deal with our heart in such a way, our whole being will be opened to the Lord, because the gateway is open.

III. Dealing with the conscience:

- A. If we are pure and single in our heart, the function of the conscience will immediately be very keen and alert.
- B. In order to know the difference between the soul and the spirit, we need a keen conscience.
- C. Our conscience can only be made right by confession and by applying the sprinkling, the cleansing of the Lord's blood—Heb. 9:14.
- D. A pure conscience is also a good conscience—1 Tim. 1:5, 19; 1 Pet. 3:16, 21.

IV. Dealing with the fellowship:

- A. Following the dealing with the conscience, the faculty of fellowship in our spirit is dealt with in 1 John 1:1-7.
- B. When the conscience is offended, it becomes a barrier and damages our fellowship with the Lord—Psa. 66:18; Isa. 59:1-2.
- C. Strictly speaking, our fellowship is dependent upon our dealing with the conscience.
- D. Fellowship will be maintained if there is nothing wrong in our conscience.

V. Dealing with the intuition:

- A. As the fellowship follows the conscience, so the intuition follows the fellowship.
- B. If we are wrong in the conscience, the fellowship is broken, and when the fellowship is broken, the intuition does not function.
- C. The function of the intuition is to sense the will of God directly.
- D. The anointing is the working of the Holy Spirit within our spirit giving us a direct sense from God—1 John 2:27:
 - 1. Through the intuition within our spirit we have an inner knowledge, not a mental understanding.
 - 2. Through the intuition within our spirit, we have an inner knowledge, sensing something of God.
 - 3. But we still need the mind to understand what we sense in the spirit.

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- 4. Our enlightened and renewed mind interprets what we sense in the intuition of our spirit.
- VI. Through the exercise of the above dealings we obtain a proper heart, a transparent and pure conscience, which gives us a perfect fellowship with the Lord, resulting in the function of the intuition.
